Dear Fellow Donor:

For 25 years, Fidelity Charitable® has been changing the world of philanthropy. In 2016, we celebrated this milestone anniversary and saw record levels of giving by our donors.

By the end of December 2016, we had given more than \$25 billion with more than 800,000 donor recommended grants—supporting more than 106,000 charities. That dedication to philanthropy has made Fidelity Charitable® the most successful fundraiser in the United States, according to *The Chronicle of Philanthropy* 400 ranking,¹ and the second-largest grant making organization in the country, second to the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.²

Our donors continue to respond generously when our communities are in need. From historic flooding in Louisiana and North Carolina to the ongoing humanitarian crisis in Syria, donors recommended tens of millions of dollars in grants to the relief efforts. For the Syrian refugee crisis alone, Fidelity Charitable granted \$7.5M to more than 200 charities directly supporting this important work.

Fidelity Charitable is committed to helping you reach your philanthropic goals. As part of that commitment, we launched the Charitable Planning Practice Management program. Building on years of experience counseling advisors on how to provide charitable planning services for philanthropic clients, we are committed to growing philanthropy through all channels, not just our donor-advised funds.

We continue to build and refine our capabilities to make giving simple, effective and accessible. Fidelity Charitable found that 81% of our grants are initiated by a donor's recommendation through our website, and it is important to us to help drive more grants—faster—to more charities. In 2016, we improved our online grant recommendation experience with more detailed reporting of each donor's giving patterns, adding the ability for each donor to quickly recall the charities he or she has previously supported.

Using our tools, our donors give more now and in the future. According to our 2016 Giving Report, nearly a quarter of grant recommendations are now scheduled in advance—another example of our donors using their donor-advised funds to plan ahead. The average number of grants per Giving Account® each year has nearly doubled in the past 10 years to 9.2 grants per Giving Account®.

We are gratified that our donors have embraced what started with a simple idea: to encourage more Americans to include philanthropy in their financial planning with a Giving Account®. We hope you will continue to use your donor-advised fund to support the charities that are important to you and that you will tell a friend about your experience.







Trustees' Philanthropy Fund

The Trustees of Fidelity Charitable maintain a separate, unrestricted fund known as the Trustees' Philanthropy Fund ("TPF"), which makes grants to nonprofits on an invitation-only basis. The TPF is separate from the donor-advised fund program and is intended to engage the Trustees and Fidelity Charitable in direct grant making.

The TPF grant program is designed to build the capacity of nonprofits to better meet their mission. The TPF has two primary areas of focus for capacity-building grants: 1) organizations that support lower-income communities; and 2) organizations that strengthen the capacity of the philanthropic sector.


Since its inception through 2016 fiscal year-end, the TPF has granted over \$20M, and in this last fiscal year, \$2.3M of capacity-building grants were made in the areas shown below.


